TO AVOID OR CORRECT ADRENAL CRISIS

- Give hydrocortisone 100 mg intramuscular (IM) in the thigh, or subcutaneous (Sub-Q) in the lower abdomen or upper arm.
- Transport to nearest emergency care facility or treat on site with:

1. IV hydrocortisone (Solu-Cortef[®]); if not available, you can use 4 mg IV or IM dexamathasone

- 2. IV isotonic saline
- 3. Continue IV hydrocortisone until oral medication is tolerated.

If patient's listed physician is unavailable, contact an endocrinologist immediately.
